- 1. Enter online at entries.huntingdoncountyfair.com or send completed General Entry Form to the Fair Office by July 1.
- 2. Entries must be entered on Saturday, August 3, from 11-5 p.m. in Neary Hall and removed Saturday, August 10, from 9-noon.
- 3. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
- 4. Tomatoes need to be exhibited with stems on. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed leaving about two inches of stems. Onion bulbs should have a two inch top.
- 5. Exhibit the number specified for each class to avoid disqualification.
- 6. The judge reserves the right to award the placing that the exhibit merits regardless of the number of entries.
- 7. Judging criteria:
 - Pick specimens from one variety.
 - Uniformity in shape, size, and color.
 - Select a specimen that is perfect, has no blemishes and is free of mechanical damage. Select others as similar to it as possible.
 - Exhibits should be of high quality and condition.
